
The Black Box Lab at Stage284 fosters a vision for new works of theatrical art as well as little known classics from around the world to enrich, entertain, and educate our community.

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

History of The Community House

In 1921, George and Emily Mandell of Hamilton built The Community House in memory of eight men of both towns who died in military service during World War I, including their son, Sam. They commissioned Guy Lowell, a respected architect of Boston and New York, to design the building, and gave The Community House in trust for the use of the residents of both towns.





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DOUG BRENDEL



Doug Brendel began his theatrical career as Bigot the Bad Elf in a Christmas musical at Franklin Elementary School in Griffith, Indiana. (He can still sing you the opening song if you'd like.) He did 9 shows in 3 years of high school, and as an adult in the Phoenix area decided to get involved in community theatre. His first audition was for a firsttime director named Kristina, who cast him and later married him. The Brendels' theatre romance persists to this day, with Kristina still telling Doug what to do and when to do it.

Doug has delighted North Shore audiences in numerous stage productions in recent years. He has appeared as King Arthur in *Camelot*, El Gallo in *The Fantasticks*, Charles in *Blithe Spirit*, and The Man in the Chair in Stage 284's production of *The Drowsy Chaperone*, among others. He was honored to create the role of the King in Stage 284's world premiere production of the musical *Stiltskin*. Doug has also been seen in a number of Black Box productions, including *Battle Not Begun*, *The Divine*, and *Civil War Letters*.

With Kristina, Doug leads New Thing, a humanitarian-aid charity in Belarus (former USSR), providing tons of donated food and goods to orphans, foster families, the homeless, the sick, and others in need. KRISTINA BRENDEL



I thought I knew who he was. He was the guy who painted that sunflowers painting that my parents had a poster of. He cut off his ear. He was a little crazy. Then along came Don McLean's song with a new interpretation... a sweet tortured soul, doomed because "the world was never meant for one as beautiful as you."

And then there were the letters to his brother Theo, and Leonard Nimoy's Vincent. The letters that Vincent wrote to Theo (which Theo kept, and have been carefully cataloged) are the clearest insight into

Vincent's heart and mind. When Nimoy read them, he was compelled to tell Vincent's story, in an intimate, personal way. He didn't want the audience to simply observe the artist, but to feel what he felt, to see the world through his eyes. I remember quite clearly the day I stumbled across Nimoy's performance on television. I was swept into Vincent's own words, his passion, his frustration and his pain. Vincent's words can be eloquent, yes; passionate, most assuredly, but they are also often petulant, stubborn, unrealistic and harsh. He was a man who did not fit in. And in the end, as Theo asserts, isn't that the point?

It is my hope that through the production more and more people will come to... "...Understand what you tried to say to me How you suffered for your sanity How you tried to set them free They would not listen, they did not know how Perhaps they'll listen now"
